House Labor-HHS-Education Appropriations Subcommittee FY23 Funding Bill Highlights

- A total of \$10.5 billion for the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), an increase of \$2 billion above the FY22 level.
 - \$758 million for global health
 - \$735 million for public health emergency preparedness cooperative agreements
 - \$106 million for public health workforce initiatives
- A total of \$124.2 billion for the Department of Health and Human Services (HHS), an increase of \$15.6 billion above the FY22 level
 - \$9.6 billion for the Health Resources and Services Administration (HRSA) including an increase of \$171 million to improve access and quality of maternal and child health services.
- A total of \$47.5 billion for the National Institutes of Health (NIH), an increase of \$2.5 billion above the FY22 level.
 - \$7.4 billion for the National Cancer Institute (NCI). This includes \$216 million for the Cancer Moonshot.
 - An increase of \$100 million for health disparities research.
 - \$64 million for the Office of Research on Women's Health.
- A total of \$2.75 billion for the Advanced Research Projects Agency for Health (ARPA-H), which is an increase of \$1.75 billion over the FY22 level

Emory's FY23 Congressionally Directed Spending Requests

- Nursing Apprenticeship Program
 - This pilot program will be embedded into the existing pre-licensure program InEmory, which is an academic-practice partnership between Emory University, Nell Hodgson Woodruff School of Nursing, and Emory Healthcare. The Nursing Apprenticeship Program will increase student exposure to the hospital setting while offering an innovative approach to nursing education. InEmory currently accepts 80 students per class; with the additional funding provided by this earmark, 40 of these students could be accepted into the Nursing Apprenticeship Program. This pilot program could add 180 additional hours of clinical education in the pre-licensure program.
- Wellness Works Community and Wellness Works Community Annex
 - The Wellness Works Community (WWC) will partner with community-based organizations and outreach workers to provide comprehensive, individualized case management and wrap-around services to meet the needs of trauma survivors to establish holistic health and well-being. WWC will provide a support system that is fully integrated with the Emory/Grady Hospital-Based Violence Intervention Program (HVIP).
 - The Wellness Works Community Annex will focus on communities with high poverty and multiple barriers to health that have been greatly affected by social injustice. The annex will empower survivors of traumatic events to enhance their recovery through imaginative and inspired forms of healing. Annex partners will provide programs designed to connect survivors with group members and various forms of support.
